A Word From Bishop Medley

Editor's note: On April 12, 2019, the Diocese of Owensboro released a list of priests who have served in the diocese against whom one or more allegations of the sexual abuse of a minor have been substantiated. In place of his regular WKC column, Bishop William F. Medley's letter accompanying the list is printed below.

April 12, 2019

My dear sisters and brothers,

In the Roman Catholic Mass for Reconciliation we pray, "When we ourselves had turned away from you on account of our sins, you brought us back to be reconciled, O Lord."

In the spirit of this prayer, the Diocese of Owensboro today is releasing a list of priests who have served in our diocese against whom one or more allegations of the sexual abuse of a minor have been substantiated.

Today as a Church we seek to again acknowledge the sins of sexual abuse of children by people they should have been able to trust without reserve. I apologize to all who have suffered at the hands of a priest. For all the times when Church leaders failed to live out Christ's call to holiness and did not do what was needed to keep you and all children safe, I am sorry.

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I apologize as well to all of you in the Diocese of Owensboro. The sexual abuse of a child is abhorrent, and the fact that this kind of evil has been perpetrated by priests rocks our Church to its core. For the anger, the sadness, the embarrassment and doubts this may have brought you, I apologize and I share in your pain and frustration.

I apologize to the dedicated and holy priests of our Church who have never in any way harmed a child. You have suffered from the stain rendered upon the priesthood by the misconduct of others.

Thankfully, since 2002 there has been significant reform in how the Church in the United States handles allegations of sexual abuse. We operate under a zero-tolerance policy. When a substantiated allegation of the sexual abuse of a minor by a priest in the Diocese of Owensboro is determined, that priest is permanently removed from ministry. Additionally, robust measures have been put into place to prevent abuse, including background checks for those who work with children and training for both children and adults. There has been a dramatic decline in the number of abuse cases over recent decades. However, I do recognize that even one person harmed is too many and we must remain committed in our efforts to keep every child safe.

The development of this list has been a thorough and painstaking process. Three former chairs of the Diocesan Review Board worked over several months with access to all diocesan files to recommend to me the names presented here. William Craig is an attorney, Dr. Mike Farina is a psychologist, and Mary Beth Hurley is a retired nurse. They have served generously because they love the Church and want it to be the best it can be, and especially to be a safe place

for children.

Inclusion on this list does not necessarily indicate that an accused priest has been found guilty of a crime or liable for any civil claim. While every allegation of abuse received today by the diocese is reported to authorities, it does not mean that the authorities will pursue charges. Often, allegations are not received until years and even decades after an incident. In some cases, the accused priests have been deceased before an allegation has been made.

We hold anyone who works for the Church to a higher standard than civil or criminal courts may require. Therefore, while inclusion on this list does not necessarily indicate guilt, it does indicate a finding on the part of the Diocese of Owensboro that there is adequate reason to believe the alleged abuse did occur.

Over the years, the Diocese of Owensboro has investigated some allegations against priests that had a semblance of credibility, but could not be substantiated. The definition of a substantiated allegation which guided the work of the reviewing committee is:

An allegation of the sexual abuse of a minor by a priest is substantiated when there is probable cause for believing the claim is true. The following may be considered as evidence of probable cause: 1) admission of guilt by the accused; 2) accused does not contest the allegation; 3) guilty finding rendered by a court; 4) finding rendered by an investigative process shows cause for believing the allegation is true on an objective basis.

The publication of this list does not indicate a closure of the matter of sexual abuse in the Church. We know that survivors of abuse present themselves

and tell their stories in their own time. This often was complicated by the Church's reluctance to hear and believe those who came forth. To any who have not come forward, have not been heard, we invite you to do that which is best for you. If that includes coming to the Church, we stand ready to listen and heal, to learn and act.

These are dark days in our Church, but as Christians we are never without hope, even at Calvary. Jesus is always our hope and our light. Throughout our history, in times of darkness and confusion, God has raised up great saints to show us the way. Our time is no different. God is most certainly rais-

ing up holy men and women in our day who are calling us back to the Gospel and reminding us once more of Christ's call to each of us to live lives of holiness. Let us keep our eyes fixed on Jesus and we will find the way.

As we approach the holiest week of the year for us as Christians, I end my letter to you with these words from then Cardinal Joseph Ratzinger given on Good Friday in 2005. Just a few short weeks later Cardinal Ratzinger became Pope Benedict XVI.

"Through your passion, crucifixion, death, and resurrection, Jesus, you have brought us the gift of forgiveness of sins. Cleanse and purify the Church you love of the sins of abuse and misconduct which have seriously wounded the Church. Bring healing and love to victims. Help us all to rededicate ourselves to the pursuit of true holiness. Amen."

Priests Who Have Served in the Diocese of Owensboro Against Whom A Substantiated Allegation of Sexual Abuse of a Minor Has Been Made

For purposes of this list, an allegation of the sexual abuse of a minor by a priest is substantiated when there is probable cause for believing the claim is true. The following may be considered as evidence of probable cause: 1) admission of guilt by the accused; 2) accused does not contest the allegation;

3) guilty finding rendered by a court; 4) finding rendered by an investigative process shows cause for believing the allegation is true on an objective basis.

I. Priests ordained for the Diocese of Owensboro

This section contains the names of priests who were ordained for the Diocese of Owensboro against whom was made at least one substantiated allegation of the sexual abuse of a minor occurring within the

Diocese of Owensboro.

- Gerald Baker. Ordained a priest of the Diocese of Owensboro in 1983. Three allegations deemed substantiated by the Diocesan Review Board. Removed from public ministry 2016.
- Paul Greenwell. Ordained in the Diocese of Louisville in 1928. Became a priest of the Diocese of Owensboro in 1937. Multiple allegations from the 1940's and 1950's deemed substantiated. Left the diocese in 1956. Deceased 1964.
- Walter Hancock. Ordained a priest of the Diocese of Owensboro in 1947. Multiple

- allegations deemed substantiated. Removed from public ministry 2002. Deceased 2012.
- Gilbert Henninger. Ordained a priest in the Diocese of Louisville in 1937. Became a priest of the Diocese of Owensboro in 1937. Multiple allegations received after his death but deemed substantiated. Deceased 1990.
- John Meredith. Ordained a priest in the Diocese of Owensboro in 1980. One allegation deemed substantiated by the Diocesan Review Board. Removed from public ministry 2013.
- Louis Piskula. Ordained a priest in the Dio-

cese of Owensboro in 1975. Six allegations deemed substantiated. From 1994 onward he was in restricted ministry and removed from public ministry in 2002. In 2014 he was convicted of child sexual abuse and sentenced to prison. Deceased 2018.

- John Speaks. Ordained a priest of the Diocese of Owensboro in 1974. One allegation deemed substantiated. Removed from public ministry in 2002.
- Carroll Wheatley. Ordained a priest of the Diocese of Owensboro in 1975. Two allegations deemed substantiated. Removed from public ministry in 2011. Deceased 2013.
- Henry Wieder. Ordained a priest of the Diocese of Owensboro in 1989. One allegation of sexual abuse received in 2002 involving incident prior to ordination deemed substantiated. Left active ministry 2003.

religious order

This section contains the names of priests either from another diocese or from a religious order who at one time served in the Diocese of Owensboro and against whom was made at least one substantiated allegation of the sexual abuse of a minor occurring within the Diocese.

Joseph Alexander. Ordained a priest in 1973 in the Order of St. Benedict. Allegation is from years prior to ordination while at St. Maur's Seminary in South Union, Kentucky. Considered substantiated and removed from public ministry in 2002.

- **Joseph Pilger.** Ordained a priest of the Diocese of Covington in 1955. Served in the Diocese of Owensboro from 1963 - 1976. Thirteen allegations deemed substantiated. Convicted of child sexual abuse in 1993. Deceased 2003.
- Louis Telegdy. Ordained as a priest of the Precious Blood Order in 1942. Served in the Diocese of Owensboro 1972-1978. One allegation received in the Diocese of Owensboro after his death. Three allegations in the Diocese of Davenport, Iowa deemed substantiated. Deceased 1995.
- Raymond Waldruff. Ordained a priest as a Franciscan Third Order Regular (TOR) in 1953. Served in the Diocese of Owensboro 1967 - 1968. Five allegations received; at least two deemed substantiated. Dismissed from the TOR in 1983. Deceased 1985.

II. Priests from another diocese or III. Allegations Which Occurred Outside the Diocese of Owensboro

This section contains the names of priests who were ordained for the Diocese of Owensboro, as well as priests from another diocese who at one time served within the Diocese of Owensboro, and against whom was made at least one substantiated allegation of the sexual abuse of a minor occurring outside the Diocese of Owensboro.

• Paul Haas. Ordained a priest in the Diocese of Nashville in 1959. Served in the Diocese of Owensboro 1966-1977. Multiple allegations in Tennessee were deemed substantiated. No allegations received in the Diocese of Owensboro. Deceased 1979.

- *Adelbert "Del" Holmes. Ordained a priest of the Glenmary Home Missioners in 1963. Served in the Diocese of Owensboro 1977-1988. One allegation in the Diocese of Richmond, Virginia. No allegations received in the Diocese of Owensboro. Deceased 2013.
- William Odom-Green. Ordained a priest in the Diocese of Owensboro in 1991. One allegation in the Diocese of Oakland, California in 1999. Convicted and sentenced to prison. No allegations received in the Diocese of Owensboro. Removed from public ministry 1999

Necessary accountability

Diocese releases list of priests with substantiated allegations

On April 12, 2019, the Friday before Holy Week began in the Catholic Church, the Diocese of Owensboro released a list of priests who had served in the diocese against whom one or more allegations of the sexual abuse of a minor have been substantiated.

In a press conference that afternoon, Bishop William F. Medley of the Diocese of Owensboro read a nearly 1,000-word letter he had released that day accompanying the list of 15 priests' names.

Bishop Medley apologized to "all who have suffered at the hands of a priest... when Church leaders failed to live out Christ's call to holiness and did not do what was needed to keep you and all children safe."

Bishop Medley said that the development of the list "has been a thorough and painstaking process" over the course of several months "with access to all diocesan files."

However, "the publication of this list does not indicate a closure of the matter of sexual abuse in the Church," he said. "To any who have not come forward, have not been heard, we invite you to do that which is best for you. If that includes coming to the Church, we stand ready to listen and heal, to learn and act."

In corresponding with the WKC after the press conference, Mary Beth Hurley, the chair of the Diocesan Review Board – which assists the bishop in reviewing and handling cases of alleged sexual abuse

by persons acting in the name of the Church – said the list's release was necessary to provide "transparency and accountability in our diocese."

"By releasing the names we hope and pray that any others who have been victimized by the individuals named, or by any other person, would come forward so that we can help them to receive help and healing," said Hurley.

Dr. Mike Farina is a current member and former chair of the Diocesan Review Board.

He told the WKC he hopes the Church can move forward "to further the healing of those who have suffered," and that all Catholics share in the responsibility to protect youth "and anyone vulnerable to disadvantage."

Fr. J. Patrick Reynolds, the diocese's vicar general and the pastor of Our Lady of Lourdes in Owensboro, said that though he had anticipated the publication of the list, "I admit that it gave me a sickening feeling when I saw it in print."

"For too long the Church attempted to hide the 'family secret,' putting stress on the public reputation of the Church," said Fr. Reynolds. "... They did not realize that the cleric was not 'healed' of such behavior by attending a retreat or by going to confession. In addition, leaders had little understanding of the long-term trauma among victims of sexual abuse."

On the other hand, Fr. Reynolds said it is painful that some of the names on the list were those "with whom I had attended school and worked with

over the years, or at least I knew as fellow diocesan priests" – men who had also "brought goodness, joy and sacramental grace into the lives of thousands of Catholics."

Jennifer Francis-Gehring, a clinical therapist at New Beginnings Sexual Assault Support Services in Owensboro, said transparency is "necessary during these times and I am pleased to see our diocese being forward thinking in this endeavor."

"New Beginnings will continue to be here within our community to serve any and all survivors of sexual abuse," she added.

"Tom," who asked that his last name be withheld for privacy, had been abused by a priest during his childhood.

He told the WKC that he believes the release of the list "took way too long," having been asking the diocese for to do so for several years. Tom said he knows people who were also victims of clergy sexual abuse, but who had passed away before having the chance to see the names published.

Tom said different people handle the topic of clergy sexual abuse in different ways: "I know people who don't want to talk about it."


But, the publication of the list will "do a lot more good than harm, in my opinion," he said, calling this "a step in the right direction," though he believes the Church "should have done more earlier."

"My whole concern was not for myself, but for other people who are victims out there," he said. ■

Representing the 'mercy of the Church'

Parishes' annulment advocates provide unique ministry

In his ministry as an annulment advocate, Deacon Michael Wiedemer works to meet people "where they're at."

"Because many times, they're hurting. Many times, they're searching," said Deacon Wiedemer in an April 15 interview with The Western Kentucky Catholic. "They're looking for something; they want to find the Church again."

And as an advocate, he tries to help them find it. Helen Bennett, whose full-time ministry is as the business manager of Our Lady of Lourdes Parish in Owensboro, also serves as an advocate.

"To be an advocate is to step into a very important role of support, for anyone who is interested in pursuing a declaration of invalidity, (also known as)

an annulment," she said.

Speaking from her own experience, Bennett explained that "no one expects to end up in a divorce situation. And it's very painful. Some people say it's even worse than death."

Bennett said that receiving her declaration of nullity many years ago paved the way for her to both remarry and to be a "practicing, active Catholic."

She said there are many reasons why someone would want to pursue this process; it is not just for someone who wishes to remarry one day.

"Some people do it because they see it as the last hurdle," said Bennett. "They see it as part of the total process and part of the healing process... They may be 70 years old and never intend to remarry."

Deacon Wiedemer said he has worked with individuals who "may not be in full communion with the Church," perhaps if they have been divorced and then remarried outside of the Catholic Church.

He said that as an advocate, he is a representative of the Church in a special way: "We represent the mercy of the Church – the mercy of Jesus Christ."

"We all make mistakes... and this is part of the understanding of the Church, to help them through that (annulment process)," he said. "To get their life back on track. And to have that authentic joy again."

Pat Cairney, the director of RCIA at St. Thomas More Parish in Paducah and an annulment advocate, said the advocate ministry serves a practical – not just spiritual – purpose.

In addition to this being "a listening ministry," he assists people in gathering documents and other paperwork required by the Church's tribunal for pursuing a declaration of nullity.

"Just as in the secular world when you're working with a pile of paperwork, it helps to have someone else to help you go through it," said Cairney.

Bennett said the Church's tribunal has put together a thorough list of questions to begin the annulment process – and this list can be intimidating. As an advocate, she likes to schedule a series of meetings with the individual pursuing the annulment, and they work through the questions together.

After that, the packet of answered questions is delivered to the tribunal, which takes it from there.

Bennett said some of the questions can be "painful, or open up old wounds."

"But going through it with someone, I think, is so helpful," she said, expressing gratitude for the

person who served as her advocate when she was worries or fears. pursuing her own declaration of nullity. "You can talk through things... it's very conversational, and it's very confidential."

Deacon Wiedemer debunked a few misconceptions about annulments. He explained that in the Diocese of Owensboro there is no fee to pursue an annulment.

Also, the children of an individual who receives an annulment will not become illegitimate: "It's just that the marriage was not sacramental," he said.

Bennett said the whole process can take a while - sometimes 12 to 24 months. After they deliver the packet to the tribunal, she keeps in contact with the people with whom she has worked, to help ease any

Cairney said people come to him from different

Sometimes the parish connects him with them, or an individual may approach him of their own accord. Other times, individuals going through RCIA - the Rite of Christian Initiation for Adults; in which people enter the Catholic Church - may ask him for assistance in this area.

"What I try to do is educate people about what is going on," he said, acknowledging that the process can be tedious. He said his role is "a matter of keeping them informed and helping them be patient."

Bennett agreed.

"It's about soul-searching," she said. "It's about

looking at yourself as much as you possibly can, and to be as open and honest with yourself and with the tribunal about what has gone on in your life and in the life of your former spouse."

"To tell your story can be very healing," she said.

Seminarian's diaconate ordination celebrates 'Church's diversity and unity'

His transitional diaconate ordination on April 13 was "one of the biggest moments of my life," but Deacon Stephen Van Lal Than also emphasized that this is "not the end, just the beginning" of his vocation to the priesthood.

"I'm just so happy," Deacon Than told The Western Kentucky Catholic after his ordination Mass at Holy Spirit Parish in Bowling Green.

Deacon Than is originally from the Southeast Asian country of Myanmar, also known as Burma. Holy Spirit became his "home parish" after he came to the United States in 2017 to study for the priesthood in the Diocese of Owensboro.

Deacon Than, as well as fellow Burmese seminarian Martin Ma Na Ling, came to the diocese in order to assist with the needs of the growing Burmese population in western Kentucky.

Deacon Than is the first Burmese seminarian to be ordained a deacon in the Diocese of Owensboro, which is the next step on a seminarian's journey toward the priesthood.

Sr. Suzanne Sims, OSU, the director of religious education at St. Pius X Parish in Owensboro, helps coordinate her parish's Burmese ministry. Sr. Sims had brought a number of her fellow Burmese parishioners to attend the ordination.

"This is a celebration of the Church's diversity and unity," she told the WKC. "(Deacon Stephen's)

witness as a leader in the Church will enrich all of us – our Church, our diocese and our world."

Fr. Brandon Williams, pastor of St. Leo Parish in Murray and co-coordinator of the diocese's worship office, called Deacon Than "a humble servant of the Lord."

"He is a great man; he will be a wonderful asset and a gift for our diocese," said Fr. Williams, who served as Bishop William F. Medley's master of ceremonies during the ordination.

Deacon Than said he "is so blessed and so grateful" for his friends and family who traveled from far away to attend the ordination Mass, including people from Michigan, Texas and Myanmar.

"God bless them all," he said. ■

'Prayer is the best thing you can do'

Couple credits community's power of prayer for kidney transplant success

Successfully donating one of her kidneys to her husband has been described to her as "rare" or "crazy," but Amanda Van Bussum says something like this doesn't happen by chance.

"It happens because we have so many people praying for us," said Amanda, a teacher at Owensboro Catholic Middle School (OCMS), who with her family belongs to Precious Blood in Owensboro.

On Tuesday, March 5, 2019 she and her husband, Travis Van Bussum, underwent two surgeries to remove one of Amanda's kidneys in order to give it to Travis, whose one remaining kidney had been failing.

"My surgery only lasted about an hour. Travis' lasted nearly four. We were so excited to get to see one another near the end of the day on Tuesday," wrote Amanda on the public Facebook page she had created for people to follow their journey, aptly

named "Travis' Trek to a New Kidney."

On the other side of their surgeries and recovering at an excellent speed, Amanda and Travis told the WKC on April 10 that their Catholic faith "is really the primary thing that kept us going."

That, in addition to their community's ongoing support - to the point where their family "can't really go anywhere without people (telling them) 'Oh, we're praying for you!" said Amanda.

"I really don't think people are just saying that," said Amanda. "I really thing they are. And it makes such a difference."

'Five to 10 years'

When Travis was a baby, doctors had discovered a tumor on one of his kidneys, requiring the kidney to be removed. And after undergoing chemotherapy, it seemed that he could return to a "normal" life - for the time being.

Travis and Amanda met in 2012 and started dating not long after. Within the first few months that they were together, Travis had an appointment with his kidney doctor.

"After the appointment he was pretty frank with me about, 'Well, this is what I have going on, and this is kind of the timeline I've been given, and so I'll need a transplant most likely," said Amanda. "The doctor said 'in five to 10 years."

At that time, Amanda was 24 and Travis was 28, and "that seemed like forever" to the newly-dating couple.

Travis, who is a chemistry and biology teacher at Apollo High School in Owensboro, would joke that when that day came along, science would have advanced enough to "grow him a new kidney."

And Amanda had figured she would give him one of her kidneys when the time came: "It just seemed

like something romantic," she said with a smile.

They were married a year later, and within that same year they started fostering and eventually adopted three young children.

Life started going "super, super fast," said Amanda.

Before they knew it, they were six years out - and it was time for a transplant.

'I have a feeling'

With three small children, the Van Bussums reevaluated the idea of Amanda being tested to see if of people willing to help out."

she could be a match for Travis. Even if Amanda was compatible, they reflected that it might not be prudent for both of them to be in surgery - and then recovering - at the same time.

"At first I was adamant that someone else would be the donor," said Travis.

Normally, he's a person who keeps a lot to himself. But this time, he wrote a letter to his friends, family and coworkers explaining that his remaining kidney was failing, and that he needed a transplant.

Travis said he was blown away by "the generosity

Approximately 30 people reached out to them with an interest in donating a kidney. But it wasn't that simple. Testing to become a living organ donor is expensive, and because of that, only one person at a time can be tested for compatibility.

One morning, Amanda woke up and "had this feeling" and told Travis that she was going to be tested.

"I thought we talked about this?" Travis had replied.

She said, "Yes, but, I just have a feeling."

On Dec. 21, 2018 she called the living donor coordinator and asked that her name be put on the list for Travis. They waited, and prayed. Amanda did a regime of bloodwork, followed by several days of extensive testing.

As his kidney's functionality decreased, Travis felt like he was "walking around in a fog."

He told himself, "There's going to be an answer. You just don't know when, but you have to keep going."

And Travis remembers the day Amanda called him: "It was February 6. And she said, 'I'm it."

Strength and grace

On March 3, the Friday before their surgeries, Amanda walked into Immaculate Parish in Owensboro – next door to her school – expecting to participate in the scheduled all-school holy hour with Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament.

It was certainly a holy hour, but it was also much more than that: the school community had come together to pray for Amanda and Travis.

Amanda was surprised to see her parents there, as well as Travis, who'd gotten a substitute teacher for his classes at Apollo so that he could come to the holy hour.

"It was pretty neat to see that many people who just had us at the forefront of what was going on," said Travis. "I mean, there's a lot of things in this world to think about. But that day, they were all just praying for us."

At one point Travis and Amanda were invited up to the front of the church for the school community to surround them in prayer.

"It was pretty powerful stuff," said Travis.

Amanda had posted on their "Travis' Trek" Facebook page only a few days earlier that their schools, their children's schools, and their parish community were "phenomenal."

"One bright side of going through trials like this is that you get a unique opportunity to see the absolute best in people," she wrote, crediting the "strength" of her community.

The best thing

Sitting in Amanda's cheery seventh-grade class-room on April 10, Travis and Amanda reiterated the power of their friends', families' and communities' prayers.

"That's what we have to owe for how we were able to maintain such strength and grace through it all, and how things were able to go as smoothly as they were," said Amanda, who had returned to school two days prior.

Travis, whose new kidney took to him quickly and was continuously improving as the days went by, was set to return to school after spring break.

More recently, the Van Bussums have announced that they're discerning the idea of fostering more children, now that Travis has been given a second chance at life.

Amanda said she once read that prayer isn't the thing to do when all other options have failed.

"Praying is the best thing you can do," she said. "It is the most powerful thing." ■

Parish hall renovation complete at St. Joseph in Central City

St. Joseph Parish in Central City held the ribbon cutting for their new parish hall back in August 2018, but it was still lacking the "finishing touches... most significantly the installation of a custom made St. Joseph stained glass window, created by Ric Sims, over the entry door and the placement of new countertops in the kitchen," said pastor, Fr. Josh McCarty.

Renovations to the parish hall became necessary after the basement flooded during a storm in 2017. In cleaning up the mess and repairing the damage, "one problem upon another was discovered," said Fr. McCarty. He said the challenges included mold, overloaded circuits, walled-over windows, plumbing problems and bare wires.

Fortunately, the stripped-down hall revealed "strong, level and true" structural bones, said Fr. McCarty, adding that "putting it all back together (took) a little over a year."

The parish family celebrated the completion of the project on March 19, 2019 - the feast of their

namesake, St. Joseph. The new hall includes a commercial kitchen, a handicap-accessible entry, a large

outside patio, optimized ductwork, balanced electrical loads, an additional heating system to provide emergency heat, a projector screen and speakers, as well as re-exposed windows providing more light.

Fr. McCarty said work was also done to take out the drop ceiling and paneling, returning to the "original character" of the building with plaster walls and a higher ceiling.

Notably, there has been no water in the parish hall since.

"The parish at large has taken ownership of the new parish hall," said Fr. McCarty. "The additional things that needed to be done were done for the safety of the people (and) for the beauty of the Church and it hit the mark."

"...Lead us not into temptation but deliver us from evil"

Editor's note: This article is the final in a six-part series on the topic of the Our Father prayer and its connection to the work of evangelization.

There is a scene in the movie "Titanic" where a passenger named Molly Brown is in a lifeboat after the Titanic has sunk and is hearing the rescue whistles of the drowning passengers from a distance. are afraid that the drowning passengers will swamp

the boat, the lifeboat will capsize, and they will all die. She says to the objections of fearful passengers,

"What's the matter with you, those are your men out there... there's plenty of room for more."

I want to speak to the phrase in the Lord's Prayer,

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"Deliver us from evil." What does it mean to deliver us from evil or the Evil One? The Catechism states in paragraph 2850, "Our interdependence in the drama of sin and death is turned into solidarity in the Body of Christ, the 'communion of saints." We pray this prayer in community and we must live it as a community. We pray, "deliver US from evil." By saying this we are committing to helping our brothers and sisters to stay away from the tempter and to not be involved with evil.

One of the ways in which we can do this is to frequent the Sacraments, especially the Sacraments of the Eucharist and Reconciliation. The devil hates nothing more than to see us humbly turn back to the Lord and seek forgiveness for our actions that have separated us from God. But our mission is not just to deliver ourselves from evil and temptation. Our mission is to go out and do what Jesus did; to bring glad tidings to the poor, to proclaim liberty to the captives and to deliver freedom to the oppressed. (See Luke 4.)

But before we can go and make disciples of all nations, we have to tend to the walking wounded of our parishes: those who need to be delivered from evil and

set free from their bondage. To not do this would be like a doctor prescribing cholesterol medication to a person with a bleeding artery on their leg. Sometimes before we preach the Gospel we have to heal the wound. And the wound may have been caused by someone in the Church. But we must do this.

How do we do this? It is as simple as a conversation over coffee with someone. It is walking with someone through a trauma in their life such as a divorce, miscarriage, or death of a loved one. It is listening with empathy but without judgement to the story of pain. It is walking with them on their journey whether or not they return to the Church. It is practicing love.

Like Molly Brown in the lifeboat, we can't ignore the rescue whistles that are all around us. Those are our men and women out there; there is plenty of room in the boat.

Why would anyone want to be a priest today?

"How can we encourage vocations to the priesthood when some priests have behaved so badly?" "Why would anyone want to be a priest today?"

The answer to these questions is that bad

shepherds highlight the need for good, holy shepherds. There is no denying that the sins of a few have harmed many. This however, is the time when the Church, including all the faithful, should challenge young men to become good, holy priests for the Church.

On May 12, the Fourth Sunday of Easter, the Church observes the 56th World Day of Prayer for Vocations. On this Sunday, as we reflect upon Jesus, the Good Shepherd, we are reminded of the need to pray for vocations to the priesthood and consecrated life. St. Teresa of Calcutta said, "I used to pray that God would feed the hungry, or do this or that, but now I pray that he will guide me to do whatever I'm supposed to do, what I can do. I used to pray for answers, but now I'm praying for strength. I used to believe that prayer changes things, but now I know that prayer changes us and we change things."

The entire Church is charged with the work of fostering vocations to the priesthood and religious life. On this day, the Church calls all of us to pray

that all people, especially those whom God is calling to the priesthood and religious life, will be open to God's will. In addition to praying that God call men and women to serve in these vocations, we need to pray also that more people answer that call.

Over the past several months, The Western Kentucky Catholic has included testimonies of men who have answered the call to the priesthood. Some of them were born and grew up here in Western Kentucky. Others have come to us from other parts of the world. They bring a variety of gifts and unique personalities. They serve in parishes, schools, hospitals, prisons, and the military. They are presiding at Mass, forgiving sins in the confessional, anointing the sick, baptizing, and witnessing two become one in the sacrament of Holy Matrimony. The message consistent among each of them is their love for the Church and for the priesthood. This is true for every priest that I know in this diocese.

The Church needs good shepherds, men striving for holiness as they live their vocation to priesthood. Our prayers and encouragement are important as we all participate in God's plan to call forth men to serve in the vineyard. In a particular way, families and parishes are places where the cultivation of vocations takes place. Following are ideas for doing so in both:

Families:

- Include a prayer for vocations as part of your meal prayer. Institute some special observance as a family for vocations.
- Pray as a family for your priests.
- Make prayer a normal part of family deci-

sion-making.

- Take part in parish activities as a family.
- Teach your children to share their time, talent, and treasure.
- Talk positively about the activities of priests, sisters, and brothers. Be careful of the way criticism of the Church is handled.
- Parishes:
- Challenge people to say one Hail Mary every day for new vocations to priesthood and religious life from your parish.
- Include prayers for vocations in the Prayers of the Faithful at Mass.
- Hold a Holy Hour for Vocations at least once a year (the World Day of Prayer for Vocations is a great time to do so).

So why would anyone want to be a priest today? Why would we want to encourage vocations to the priesthood? Because the Church needs good, holy priests imitating the Good Shepherd, Jesus Christ. We need good priests today so that the humble flock may reach where the Shepherd, Jesus Christ has prepared a place for us in heaven.



El Obispo Medley pidió que, para esta edición en lugar de su artículo habitual en el WKC, se publique su carta que acompaña esta lista.

12 de abril del 2019 Viernes de la 5ta Semana de Cuaresma

Mis queridos hermanos y hermanas,

En la Misa Católica por la reconciliación oramos, "Cuando nos habíamos apartado de ti por nuestros pecados, Señor, nos reconciliaste contigo."

En el espíritu de esta oración, la Diócesis de Owensboro el día de hoy publica una lista de sacerdotes quienes han prestado servicio a nuestra diócesis y contra quienes se ha fundamentado uno o más alegatos de abuso sexual de un menor de edad.

Hoy, como Iglesia, buscamos reconocer de nuevo los pecados del abuso sexual de menores de edad por parte de personas en las que deberían haber podido confiar sin reservas. Ofrezco una disculpa a todos los que han sufrido a manos de un sacerdote. Por todas las veces en que los líderes de la Iglesia fallamos en vivir el llamado de Cristo a la santidad y no hicimos lo necesario por mantenerlos seguros a ustedes y a todos los niños, lo siento.

Ofrezco también una disculpa a todos ustedes en la Diócesis de Owensboro. El abuso sexual de un niño es abominable, y el hecho de que los sacerdotes hayan perpetrado este tipo de maldad estremece a nuestra Iglesia en lo más profundo. Por la ira, la tristeza, la vergüenza y las dudas que esto puede haberles causado, les pido disculpas y comparto su dolor y frustración.

Ofrezco una disculpa a los sacerdotes dedicados y santos de nuestra Iglesia y que nunca han hecho

daño a ningún niño. Ustedes han sufrido debido a la mancha que se ha dejado sobre el sacerdocio por la mala conducta de otros.

Afortunadamente desde el 2002, ha habido una reforma significativa en la manera en que la Iglesia en los Estados Unidos trata los alegatos de abuso sexual. Operamos bajo una política de cero-tolerancia. Cuando se ha fundamentado un alegato de abuso sexual de un menor de edad por parte de un sacerdote en la Diócesis de Owensboro, ese sacerdote es removido permanentemente del ministerio. Además, se han implementado medidas robustas para prevenir el abuso, que incluyen la verificación de antecedentes de quienes trabajan con menores de edad y entrenamiento en ambiente seguro de niños v adultos. Ha habido una disminución dramática en el número de casos de abuso en las últimas décadas. Sin embargo, reconozco que incluso solo una persona perjudicada es demasiado, y debemos de seguir comprometidos en nuestros esfuerzos por mantener seguros a todos los menores de edad.

El desarrollo de esta lista ha sido un proceso exhaustivo y meticuloso. Tres ex presidentes de la Junta de Revisión Diocesana trabajaron durante varios meses con acceso a todos los archivos diocesanos para recomendarme los nombres que aquí se presentan. William Craig es abogado, el Dr. Mike Farina es psicólogo y Mary Beth Hurley es enfermera jubilada. Han servido generosamente porque aman a la Iglesia y desean que la Iglesia sea lo mejor que pueda ser, y especialmente que sea un lugar seguro

para los niños.

La inclusión en esta lista no indica necesariamente que un sacerdote acusado haya sido declarado culpable de un delito o responsable de cualquier denuncia civil. Aunque todos los alegatos de abuso recibidos hoy en día por la diócesis se informan a las autoridades, esto no significa que las autoridades presentarán cargos. A menudo, los alegatos no se reciben hasta años e incluso décadas después de un incidente. En algunos casos, los sacerdotes acusados han fallecido antes de que se haya hecho un alegato.

Nosotros esperamos mucho más de cualquier persona que trabaje para la Iglesia comparado con lo que puedan exigir los tribunales civiles o penales. Por lo tanto, aunque la inclusión en esta lista no necesariamente indica culpabilidad, sí indica una conclusión por parte de la Diócesis de Owensboro de que existe una razón adecuada para creer que ocurrió el abuso alegado.

A lo largo de los años, la Diócesis de Owensboro ha investigado algunos alegatos contra sacerdotes que tenían cierta apariencia de credibilidad, pero que no podían ser fundamentados. La definición de un alegato fundamentado que guió el trabajo del comité de revisión es:

Un alegato de abuso sexual de un menor de edad

por un sacerdote se fundamenta cuando existe una causa probable para creer que la afirmación sea cierta. Lo siguiente puede ser considerado como evidencia de causa probable: 1) una admisión de culpabilidad por parte del acusado; 2) el acusado no se opone al alegato; 3) una sentencia de culpabilidad dictada por un tribunal; 4) la conclusión de un proceso de investigación muestra una razón para creer que el alegato es cierto sobre una base objetiva.

La publicación de esta lista no indica un cierre de la cuestión del abuso sexual en la Iglesia. Sabemos que los sobrevivientes de abuso se presentan y comparten sus historias en su propio momento. A menudo esto se complicaba debido a la renuencia de la Iglesia a escuchar y creer a los que se presentaban. A cualquiera de ustedes que no ha dado este paso, o que no haya sido escuchado, lo invitamos a hacer lo que para usted sea lo mejor. Si eso incluye venir a la Iglesia, estamos listos para escuchar y sanar, para aprender y actuar.

Mantengamos nuestros ojos fijos en Jesús y encontraremos el camino.

A medida que nos acercamos a la semana más santa del año para nosotros como cristianos, termino mi carta con estas palabras del Cardenal Joseph Ratzinger del Viernes Santo del 2005. Apenas unas pocas semanas después, el Cardenal Ratzinger se convertiría en el Papa Benedicto XVI.

"A través de tu pasión, crucifixión, muerte y resurrección, Jesús, nos has traído el don del perdón de los pecados. - Paul Greenwell. Ordenado en la Diócesis de Louisville en 1928. Se convirtió en sacerdote de la Diócesis de Owensboro en 1937. Múltiples alegatos de las décadas de 1940 y de 1950 se consideraron fundamentados. Salió de la diócesis en 1956. Falleció en 1964.
- Walter Hancock. Ordenado sacerdote de la Diócesis de Owensboro en 1947. Múltiples alegatos considerados fundamentados. Retirado del ministerio público en 2002. Falleció en 2012.
- Gilbert Henninger. Ordenado sacerdote en la Diócesis de Louisville en 1937. Se convirtió en sacerdote de la Diócesis de Owensboro en 1937. Múltiples alegatos fueron recibidos después de su muerte, pero son considerados fundamentados. Falleció en 1990.
- John Meredith. Ordenado sacerdote en la Diócesis de Owensboro en 1980. Un alegato considerado fundamentado por la Junta de Revisión Diocesana. Retirado del ministerio público en 2013.
- Louis Piskula. Ordenado sacerdote en la Diócesis de Owensboro en 1975. Seis alegatos considerados fundamentados. A partir de 1994, estuvo en el ministerio restringido y se retiró del ministerio público en 2002. En 2014 fue condenado por abuso sexual infantil y condenado a prisión. Falleció en 2018.
- John Speaks. Ordenado sacerdote de la Diócesis de Owensboro en 1974. Un alegato considerado fundamentado. Retirado del ministerio público en

2002.

- Carroll Wheatley. Ordenado sacerdote de la Diócesis de Owensboro en 1975. Dos alegatos considerados fundamentados. Retirado del ministerio público en 2011. Falleció en 2013.
- Henry Wieder. Ordenado sacerdote de la Diócesis de Owensboro en 1989. Un alegato de abuso sexual recibido en 2002 que involucraba un incidente antes de la ordenación se consideró fundamentado. Dejó el ministerio activo en 2003.

- Raymond Waldruff. Ordenado sacerdote de la Tercera Orden de San Francisco (V.O.T.) en 1953. Sirvió en la Diócesis de Owensboro 1967 1968. Cinco alegatos recibidos; al menos dos considerados fundamentados. Despedido de la V.O.T. en 1983. Falleció en 1985.

En la parroquia:


- Desafíen a la gente a decir un Ave María todos los días por nuevas vocaciones al sacerdocio y la vida religiosa de su parroquia.
